Deciding on the Format


This presentation looks at various formats for *organising* information coherently in one place, ready for essay or report writing, revision, etc.

The next few slides will illustrate these options, for you to examine the pros and cons.



Accretion

The growth of the continental masses over geologic time via the addition of marine sediments. These sediments are added on to the edges of the continents through tectonic collision with other oceanic or continental plates


Accumulation Surface addition of snow to a glacier or snowfield.

Accumulation Zone (1) Region in a glacier where there is a surface net addition of snow. (2) Part of a hillslope that has a net gain of material leading to a progressive fising of the slope's surface.


Acid (1) Substance having a pH less than 7. (2) Substance that releases hydrogen ions (H+).

Acid Deposition Atmospheric deposition of acids in solid or liquid form on the Earth's surface. Also see acid precipitation

Spidergrams








- Note taking

Constructing a mind map




Mind Map summarising the life of Marie Curie

Linear Notes

The most common form of note taking. The key points:

- Use lined paper wide lined is best
- Leave a right-hand margin for later additions
- For CLARITY write on every other line
- Try to use **colour** if possible
- Can use **headings** from essay/report titles
- Ideal if word processed as reorganising very simple





Assistive Technology

- Mind mapping software
- PowerPoint presentations are a useful resource for organising information for presentations as well as for other purposes, such as getting your content in order in preparation for writing a report or essay
- Recording verbal information on mobile devices or digital recorders
- Revision apps that provide post-it tabs or flash cards that can be moved around/manipulated, stored and accessed easily
